Inordinate Delay in FIR Registration: A Threat to Personal Liberty

The prompt registration of a First Information Report (FIR) is crucial for a fair criminal justice process. A significant delay in registering an FIR harms personal liberty and weakens the constitutional right to due process under Article 21 of the Constitution of India. Delays in recording FIRs often lead to loss of evidence, manipulation of facts, and unnecessary harassment of individuals by law enforcement. Courts in India have consistently stressed that police are required by law to register an FIR when they receive information about a cognizable offense.

Immediate FIR registration is essential to prevent the arbitrary use of police powers. When police officials intentionally delay registration, they gain undue discretion to informally detain suspects or conduct unauthorized investigations. Such actions infringe on personal liberty by subjecting individuals to coercion without proper legal protections. The Supreme Court has stated that refusing or delaying FIR registration is an abuse of authority and violates the rule of law.

Judicial oversight of police discretion is crucial in tackling this issue. Courts have clarified that registering an FIR is mandatory when information indicates a cognizable offense, and that preliminary inquiries should be limited to rare cases. These guidelines aim to reduce police arbitrariness and protect citizens from illegal detention or intimidation. Use of Ambiguous or Double-Meaning Language in Police Records

This imprecise language gives law enforcement too much discretionary power and weakens judicial review over police actions. Without clear documentation, individuals may face arbitrary arrest, detention, or investigation, violating the personal liberty protections guaranteed under Article 21 of the Constitution of India.

Ambiguous language often shows up in First Information Reports, arrest memos, and case diaries. When police use vague terms, the accused cannot fully understand the nature of the allegations against them. This lack of clarity hinders their right to prepare a defense and undermines the principles of justice. The criminal justice system needs clear and transparent records, as vague police documentation reduces the value of official evidence.

Judicial oversight has been vital in discouraging these practices. Courts have stressed that police records must include specific facts rather than just general claims. The Supreme Court has repeatedly asserted that the reasons for an arrest must be clear and communicated to the arrested person. Improper Return and Substitution of Case Documents

While investigations require time and careful evidence collection, prolonged inaction or unexplained delays in apprehending the accused weaken criminal law enforcement and harm the administration of justice. Such failures can indirectly affect the personal liberty of both the complainant and other suspects by prolonging uncertainty and promoting arbitrary investigative methods.

The Code of Criminal Procedure requires police authorities to conduct investigations promptly and efficiently. When the accused remains untraced for a long time, it may signal negligence, a lack of diligence, or intentional inaction by the investigating authorities. Delays in apprehension often allow the accused to escape, destroy evidence, or influence witnesses, which undermines the prosecution's case. Under the Code of Criminal Procedure, the Magistrate does not have to accept the police report's conclusions. The Magistrate can review the information presented independently. This judicial authority prevents the police from closing cases without justification or from shielding accused individuals through incomplete or manipulated investigations.
