MOVIE SERIES REVIEW: THE PURGE

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INTRODUCTION

This recurring cycle of violence and oppression serves as a cautionary tale, warning against the dangers of extreme political ideologies and the erosion of civil liberties in the name of social order.

The concept of "The Purge" draws inspiration from historical events and traditions, such as the Roman festival of Saturnalia, where social norms were temporarily upended, and revelry and

lawlessness prevailed. However, the films take this concept to a horrifying extreme, portraying the catastrophic consequences for society.

As the hours pass, the Sandins are thrust into a relentless battle for survival, defending their home against the unrelenting attackers who are determined to gain entry. Amid this life-or-death struggle, the family members are forced to confront their own ethical decisions, coming face to face with the grim consequences of The Purge, both on a personal level and as a striking commentary on the state of society at large.

THE PURGE: ANARCHY (2014 set in 2023)

The migrant community successfully weathered the Purge, but when morning came, many of Juan and Adela's co-workers were conspicuously absent. A violent encounter with self-proclaimed Forever Purgers resulted in Adela and her boss, Darius, being arrested by the police for defending themselves.

Simultaneously, the Tucker family ranch fell into the hands of their white farmhands, who had become Forever Purgers, seeking to claim the property. In a selfless act, patriarch Caleb Tucker sacrificed himself, buying time for Juan and a co-worker named T.T. to rescue Caleb's son Dylan, Dylan's pregnant wife Cassie, and his sister Harper. Their escape coincided with the national declaration of a Forever Purge by civilians, disregarding the NFFA's orders to stand down.

Juan, T.T., and the others eventually found and rescued Adela and Darius from Purgers. Darius chose to stay behind in search of his family, while the rest fled from the burning city of Austin. At a gas station, they learned that Canada and Mexico had temporarily opened their borders to protect non-Purge civilians. This brief window of opportunity prompted the group to head for the Mexican border at El Paso.

As they arrived in a chaotic El Paso, the NFFA had imposed martial law to contain the violence, and Adela and Cassie were separated from the group by military forces.

Meanwhile, Juan, T.T., Dylan, and Harper were captured by the Purge Purification Force (PPF). The PPF's Alpha Leader offered Dylan and Harper a chance at survival if they executed T.T. and Juan. Canada and Mexico announced the early closure of their borders, leaving those seeking refuge vulnerable to the Purgers.

The diminished group eventually regrouped at a hidden safe-house maintained by a local Native American tribe. The Native leader offered to transport them as refugees across the border. In the desert, Juan, Adela, Dylan, the Native leader, and his men

made a defiant stand against the PPF, providing an opportunity for other refugees to escape. When they ran out of ammunition, they engaged the PPF in a brutal hand-to-hand combat, defeating them. The trio rejoined the others in a refugee camp across the Mexican border, where Dylan reunited with Harper and Cassie, and met his newborn daughter.

News reports indicated that the NFFA had dispatched troops but was crumbling under the uncontrolled violence. More than two million Americans had sought refuge across the Canadian and Mexican borders, and civilians across the United States were rallying to resist the Purgers.

SATURNALIA AND "THE PURGE"

This ancient holiday, which had its beginnings in a single day of feasting millennia ago, experienced a transformational evolution to become a weeklong event marked by extravagance and excess. Saturnalia was created by the rulers of the period as a planned move to provide the public a legal avenue to vent their pent-up hatred and vexation, ostensibly resulting in fewer criminal offenses in the following year.

The similarities between "The Purge" and Saturnalia are striking, as both involve the temporary suspension of legal and societal norms for a set period of time. These events were strategically used by rulers to highlight the benefits of living under their rule.

The popularity of Saturnalia declined with the conversion of Emperor Constantine to Christianity in 312 AD, signifying the ascension of Christianity as the official religion of the Roman Empire. Saturnalia was eventually superseded by a new Christian holiday, Christmas.

The prospect of a real-life "Purge" raises ethical and pragmatic concerns. According to Forbes Magazine, an authentic Purge would exacerbate socioeconomic disparities, normalise violent behaviour, and wreck havoc on the economy, potentially destabilising sectors such as the insurance industry, real estate market, and small businesses.
